TROOP GROUP TRAVEL

GLOBAL AWARENESS

Every Girl Scout is part of a special group of girls that stretches not just across the United States, but around the world. Girl Scouts of the USA (GSUSA) is a member of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS), which includes 10 million girls in 150 countries! All those girls are working to make the world a better place.

Raise your global awareness with these three activities:

U World Thinking Day (Required)

With an adult, go to girlscouts.org/worldthinkingday to find out about this year's World Thinking Day award. Choose one activity that you can do to get started and list it here:

International Friends (Required)

With an adult, research online to learn about WAGGGS, its five regions, and 150 member organizations. Write about what you learn, or discuss your findings with a friend or family member.

Choose one or more:

- □ Learn to cook a full meal from a WAGGGS country and share it with your family and friends. (Cadettes: check out the New Cuisines badge.)
- Complete a Civic Engagement badge activity. Learn more at girlscouts.org/badges.
- Research Lord and Lady Baden Powell. Discuss how their work has contributed to Girl Scouting.
- Learn about Girl Scouts Overseas. Discuss how their participation is similar or different to yours.
- List the five WAGGGS World Centers and their locations. Take a virtual tour of one or more of the World Centers.

GLOBAL CITIZEN

"Global" means relating to the whole world. A global organization is worldwide and international, and from the beginning, the Girl Guide and Girl Scout Movement has been international in nature.

Become a global citizen with these activities:

- Learn about a country through storytelling, art, or music.

Choose one or more:

- Take a virtual tour of the United Nations (un.org).
- □ Plan a trip outside of San Diego County. Use public transportation and plan to stay overnight. Research inexpensive activities, and find a way to connect with other Girl Scouts who live there.
