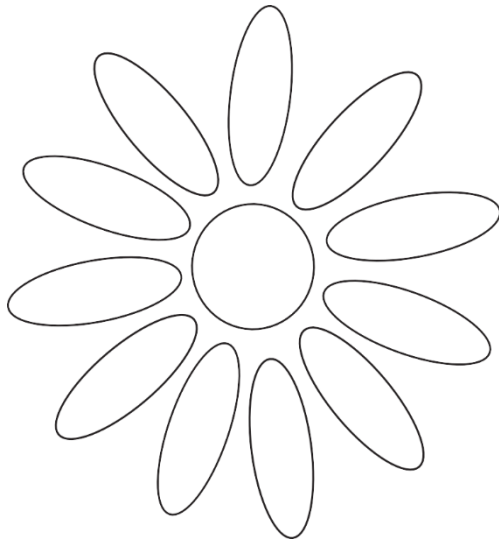


Daisy Girl Scout Activities

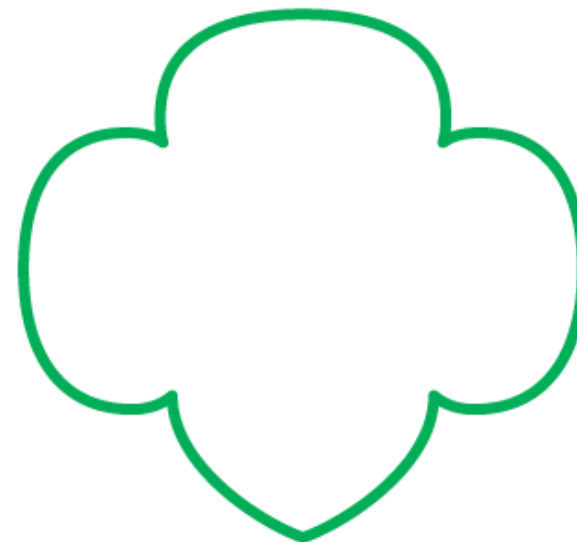
